Thurman ran outside and across the lawn as fast as his legs could go.


Tiger turned to Marshmallow. "Where's he going?" "Ribbit, ribbit," said Marshmallow.

"No, I haven't," she said, "but follow his paw prints. I see them in the leaves across the lawn. "Tiger, did you say something that scared Thurman?"



Your Thoughts, Feelings and Actions


The way you *think* affects the way you *feel*. The way you *feel* affects the way you *act*.
